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
Our book recommendations

IAPM Partner: Interview with PMU

We interviewed the two founders of Project Management United (PMU). Under the umbrella of the PMU, the PM & PMO Conference BRIDGE will take place this year in September. We talked to the two inspiring women Edita Kemzūraitė and Inga Ablingiene about, among other things, what motivated them to initiate the event and how they managed to get it off the ground. The interview is definitely worth reading and it gives you a great insight into what to expect at the PM & PMO Conference BRIDGE!



My name is Edita Kemzūraitė and I am the co-founder and head of content of the PM and PMO conference BRIDGE at Project Management United. So, as you might imagine, high quality content and research around the conference topic is my primary focus. As a practitioner, I work at Bentley Systems as an IT project manager. My company delivers innovative software such as Digital Twin Technology for advancing infrastructure. I'm proud that I'm also taking on the role of sustainability ambassador in my company, connecting colleagues and partners around the globe to discuss the importance of sustainability and how we could work together towards tomorrow.

> I'm Inga Ablingiene and I'm mainly responsible for partnerships at Project Management United and I organise our main conference BRIDGE. I also have experience in working with projects in different organisations. Now I am a partner for project development delivery at Transport Innovation Association. Basically, I am responsible for multicountry international projects with different kind of stakeholders in the transport innovation area.









The Project Management United, PMU, is the organisation that organises the PM and PMO conferences BRIDGE. Are there other tasks that PMU carries out?

Inga: This is our main activity, and the focus is on the annual conference for PMs and PMOs. In addition, we are also an ATO candidate for Green Project Management and we are seeking to increase awareness of Green Project Sustainable Project Management within companies organisations and within our community. With the content of sustainable project management, but also with the involvement of certain organisations that are making our world greener, we try to add value to our community and to the participants of the conference. I would like to mention one of our projects and initiatives already: instead of giving a welcome bag to our participants, everyone, will get a certificate that he has planted a tree.

So last year was the first year with your conference. How did you get the idea to organise this conference?

Edita: Yeah, last year was our first conference, so we started from the very beginning. The idea came up because of our practical experience and in conversations with our friends, partners and colleagues. We truly appreciate the valuable insights from globally recognized experts and our great friends Dr. Al Zeitoun, Americo Pinto and Žydra Tubelytė who were - and still are - our great advisors and supporters in this exciting journey. We both hold Project Management Professional (PMP) certifications, but we found that there is usually no one size fits all solution and that organisations have different standards for their project management. Therefore, our intention and our main mission was to enhance the project management profession by connecting different certification providers, project management schools, education providers, global outstanding speakers and thinkers in order to create this new profile of a project manager who is ready for the current challenges and the future. A project manager who has a really strong skillset for making decisions and for leading teams. We found that if we have a single conference which could connect those people to come and join us in one big event that would be win-win and win situation, right? So this is how we started – from our mission to enhance and sustain the profession.









You both have full-time jobs; how do you handle it when your day only has 24 hours? How do you manage to organise everything?

<u>Inga</u>: So, we are four people. We have a designer, and we have another colleague who is responsible for marketing and communication. Edita is the content manager, and I am responsible for the partnerships. Of course, all these issues are interrelated, and we work together, and we already are a team. We have a set up how we work, our roadmap and we do it little by little based on our capacity. First, we develop the content, and as soon as we have the idea and the scope of the content, we build the whole agenda on it and invite speakers. Our network of partners supports us in finding speakers. We do our tasks in small steps. Apparently, it works.

<u>Edita</u>: Personally, I can say that we really have a dream team. I cannot imagine the conference organisation without Inga, Remigijus and Indre who are really outstanding in their functions. We collaborate a lot and both activities, my work as a practitioner and my work here as co-founder of the conference, complement each other very well. And here is how: when I research the content for the topics



and learn something new, analyse some new trends, I can spread that in my organisation, my team, so we can think about how we can improve the way we work with IT PMO or beyond. Also, I can just test if everything we bring to the conference really works in practice. I simply cannot imagine one without the other. Of course, it's not always easy to keep the balance, but if you have a vision and believe in that vision, it works.









Great. Let's talk about your conference now.

Edita: We have decided to hold this year's conference on a magic day: 22 September 2022. We invite everyone to join us locally, in the heart of Vilnius, Lithuania, at the Radisson Blu Hotel. The conference will be held hybrid again this year, but we hope to meet as many people as possible physically. So, the main topic of the conference, as we already mentioned, will be sustainable project management and PMO. It is not only about what results we can achieve with a project, but also about what results can be generated for society. It is about a sustainable mindset: How we can work more effectively, how can we organise our projects? It all starts with a strategy at the highest level. So, we are not only inviting project managers to attend our conference, but also the executives who have developed the visions and strategies. We are going to talk about technical progress and how innovative solutions can help project managers save time and make their work more effective. What skills do project managers need to be futureready? Not only in terms of time, budget, and scope. A project manager has to go beyond that. He has to think about stakeholder engagement, about benefits and project outcomes, as well as how to be a change agent who brings the change to sustainable projects. Our agenda builds on these topics, and we are pleased to have three outstanding keynote speakers. Professor Gilbert Silvius will introduce

us to the topic of sustainable project management. We are also pleased to invite Joel Carboni, President of the Green Project Management Organisation, who will talk to us about the Sustainable Development Goals and his perspective on them. Finally, we are pleased to have Inga Popovaite, she is a researcher and has spent two weeks at the Mars Simulation Station. She has practical experience of how people can live with limited resources and in a very sustainable way. It is important for us to bring in practical experience so that people can learn from others and know how to improve their way of working.











If you could talk to someone who is not yet sure whether he or she should attend, what would you say that person? Why should they attend your event?

<u>Inga</u>: I would say that this event will be different from other project management events. This year we have a one-day conference and an additional day for site visits with the possibility to experience real project management, like how sustainable project management and sustainable product management is implemented in different companies. We give our best to be the best hosts for our participants and to create value for professional work.

<u>Edita</u>: The whole team is convinced that we can only make a difference together. That's why we want to build a strong and mature community that thinks not only about their organisations but also about the whole planet. It is our call to action and together we can start with small steps. This conference is for staying aligned with the latest trends of Project Management Profession as well as building the sustainable mindset and culture.

<u>Inga</u>: There is one more point to mention, Vilnius in September is very beautiful. Therefore, we invite our guests not only to gain knowledge and experience for their professional life, but also to take the opportunity to visit our beautiful capital.

<u>Edita</u>: Yeah, and it's probably worth mentioning that one of our team members is a professional tour guide, for sure there will be opportunities to visit our beautiful Vilnius! And if you ask us what we are expecting this year, we are probably dreaming of a really big event on site, because we want to make sure you have the best networking experience. There will be some exhibition areas as well from our partners. We would be pleased to welcome you on site!
